



STARCAT'S CORNER

The recent ice storms have unquestionably affected beings throughout the state of Maine. However, I noticed that in the media the focus was almost exclusively on the effect on humans and our "property". If the effects of the heavy ice on the trees (who I would argue were the ones most hurt by it) were mentioned at all, it was only in the context of "damage to property" or the fact that limbs fell on electric lines or houses. Animals and birds were only mentioned, to my knowledge, in the context of pets who may not have been welcomed in Red Cross shelters.

Now without a doubt we humans were inconvenienced by the storms, some much more severely than others. But as pagans, I think we must look at the bigger picture.

I am no forestry expert by any means, but one perspective on the devastation to many trees is that it will make the forests healthier in the long run. The weaker trees would have been the first to fall, making way for younger, healthier trees, and trees of different varieties, to grow. Fallen trees will become homes for wildlife. Nature is adaptable, especially over long periods of time. he tree community will eventually be revitalized.

However, on an individual basis, consider the shock to the trees that lost limbs and perhaps life. Time runs much slower for long-lived trees than for humans, so the speed with which ice built up and broke or shattered the trees was like a lightning bolt. In the days after the storm, as I traveled around I could feel a sense of sadness mixed with disbelief from areas where many trees had been hurt and killed. It will no doubt take months or years before many of the survivors will return to their usual way of being.

Animals and birds were, if anything, more affected by the ice than humans. Those without caves or burrows, such as herds of deer, must be having a really hard time finding shelter. Food was (and is) hard to come by when by a thick impenetrable layer of ice covers the ground and trees. Birds were cold and wet, and many surely died as a result of the ice storms. Again, taking a long-term view one can argue that species of animals will thrive as a result of their diminished numbers, and the ice storms are certainly a phenomenon of nature. But I have a hard time getting beyond the sorrow I feel for the individual creatures in their pain and suffering to truly embrace this view.

One reason that our selfishness in describing how the crisis affected Maine as a whole disturbs me is the cause of our shifts in weather. Having lived in Maine my whole life, I have noticed changes in our weather patterns. I believe global warming due to our pollution of the ecosystem plays a large part in the changes taking place. We shouldn't be so surprised and almost insulted by what comes of it. Karma, anyone? Of course, if as a society we're ignorant and selfish enough to pollute our home to this extent and then deny it, I shouldn't be surprised that we focus on our own survival to the exclusion of other equally valid life forms.

Speaking of other life forms. I wonder how the nature spirits were affected by the recent weather. No doubt there were faeries frolicking in joy; the ice was very beautiful even in its destruction. what about dryads who lost their homes? (I must mention here, with



this talk of homeless tree nymphs, an excellent and hilarious novel that Quester and I just read. If you haven't read *Tex and Molly in the Afterlife* by Maine writer Richard Grant, you should!)

I guess it will take time to examine the changes made and damage done. In the spring, as we are able to hike out into the woods, we can see and feel for ourselves how the extreme weather has affected the greater reality around us.

Freedom from persecution?

Katha Pollitt, feminist and columnist, wrote about the Freedom From Religious Persecution Act, a proposal which would limit U.S. aid to countries that deny religious freedoms: "Nor need women fleeing genital mutilation, domestic violence, rape and other oppressive customs fear that they'll be pushed to the back of the refugee queue, which according to the bill must favor victims of religious intolerance over other sorts of victims. After all, no less an authority than Pat Robertson has famously labeled feminism a form of witchcraft—and witchcraft, that is, Wicca, is definitely a religion." (The Nation, 10/13/97)

Hide the gargoyles

A merchant who sold gargoyle and troll figurines and African art was evicted from the Town Center Mall in Cobb, Ga., after some patrons objected to his merchandise as satanic. Jim LaTorre, the proprietor of the Mystico store, said mall managers had no trouble with his product line when he opened the store, which is similar to others he's owned in the area. One Saturday, however, a group of fundamentalist Christians began harassing his saleswoman; soon afterward, mall management ordered LaTorre to get rid of his entire product line or lose his lease. (Atlanta Journal-Constitution, 11/6/97)

Marilyn Manson is not the Goddess

In Bellingham, Wash., the local paper made gratuitous references to Witchcraft after a bunch of teenage Marilyn Manson fans broke into a tomb, opened a grave, got stoned, sprayed Satanic slogans and symbols in fake blood, and had one girl dance nude for the mostly-male group. In reporting this witless event, the Bellingham Herald quoted an "expert" as saying there were "at least three" covens in the area. Not only do local Witches have no connection to this kind of juvenile behavior, but there is a thriving community of Pagan shops, magazines and many more than three groups. (Bellingham Herald, 11/8/97)

Speaking of Satanism

Anton LaVey, founder of the Church of Satan and author of "The Satanic Bible," died Oct. 29 at age 67. While his brand of Satanism emphasized rational free-thinking, his performance in the role (black cape, big scary Victorian house, pet tarantula, taste for eerie organ music) led many to believe he was evil incarnate. Many more confused his attention-getting path with Witchcraft, leading to all sorts of trouble that persists to this day. (Associated Press, 11/1/97)

Timber temple

A widely reported discovery this fall was the traces of a Neolithic timber temple twice the size of Stonehenge. The temple at Stanton Drew, Somerset, was detected with high-tech instruments designed to reveal ancient remains without disturbing the land. The newly discovered henge is a near-perfect circle with an outer diameter of about 443 feet. Within the Great Circle are at least nine concentric circles that are thought to be burial pits. English Heritage said it will examine only the remains of the temple posts, which may have stood up to 30 feet above ground. The rest of the site will not be extensively excavated. Even though the site is located on 37 acres of private farmland, it will be open to the public, English Heritage said. (Associated Press, 11/10/97)

Saxon burial

Meanwhile, on a U.S. air base in England, archaeologists have discovered dozens of pagan Saxon graves containing more than 170 bodies of men, women and even babies. They also discovered the first horse to be found buried with its master in Britain, complete with decorative harness. The artifacts found on the site date from about the year 550. (Associated Press, 12/2/97)

Labyrinth Grove

Pagans who pressed their case after being denied the right to perform a wedding at a "non-denominational" New Hampshire site are now planning a service in memory of members of Earth-centered religions, especially those who served in the military. The proprietors of Cathedral in the Pines have donated an undeveloped space in which the Pagans will plant a Labyrinth Grove, and are soliciting donations of rocks, crystals, and herb seeds at AppleMoon / WADL-New England, c/o 38 Fitch Bridge Road, Groton, MA 01450-1253. (AppleMoon press release)

Pagans on BBC

A British Broadcasting Corp. show in October examined paganism, "claimed by some to be the fastest-growing religion in Britain." For some reason the BBC doesn't come in very well in Maine, but the program note advertised "a visit to a witches' coven and meetings with a druid musician and members of an Odinic rite." It was narrated by Jenny Agutter, the actress who starred in "Equus" and "Logan's Run." (BBC, 11/30/97)

Pagan projects

In Massachusetts, the Sacred Paths Alliance Network raised more than \$2,000 for AIDS charities with its Witches' Ball. The band Aerosmith, which owns the Mama Kin nightclub, donated the club facilities for the night, and Janet Farrar and Gavin Bone were special guests for the evening. This year's proceeds went to the Children's AIDS Program. (SPAN press release)

Drawing down the book ban

In Wichita Falls, Texas, a group of Witches offered to provide information when parents from an Assemblies of God church challenged Witch-related books in school libraries. School board members reviewed the books and removed four of the nine from the shelves; "Drawing Down the Moon" remains, and the parents are still angry. (Wichita Falls Times Record News, 12/3/97)

One of the crowd

The Washington Post included Wicca and the Winter Solstice in a roundup of religious holidays that also included the beginning of the Muslim observance of Ramadan and the anniversary of the death of Zarathustra (Zoroaster). (Washington Post, 12/6/97)

Happy Solstice, Your Eminence

The Archbishop of Canterbury, leader of the Church of England, broadcast messages of Christian faith throughout shopping malls in Britain. The date of the broadcasts? Dec. 21, the day of the Pagan Yule. (BBC News, 12/8/97)

They met in D.C.

A couple hundred Pagans danced and drummed at the Jefferson Memorial on Samhain for the "Blessed Be and Meet Me in D.C." event. The Washington Post quoted a member of a Virginia coven as part of its roundup of Halloween events. (Washington Post, 11/1/97)

HINTS FROM HEKATE, TIPS FOR THE PRACTICAL PAGAN*


I'm sure everybody knows about turning off the telephone before circle, but have you ever forgotten to turn it back on afterward? I have, and Arwen from the I.G. has the ideal solution. Simply write a note with permanent marker on the bottom of your cakes plate reminding yourself about the telephone ringer. When you go to wash the plate after circle, you'll see the note and save yourself some embarrassment!

There's nothing more distracting during a ritual than to have the fire alarms go off just when you're burning up those pieces of paper with last year's troubles written on them, or when you're just centering after having lit that new batch of dragon's blood incense. Aree from Wahtonah Grove has an elegant solution: shower caps! You just stretch one over every smoke alarm in the building (sometimes a step-ladder is needed when working in your local U.U. church or anywhere with high ceilings), and you can cloud up the place to your heart's content!

Speaking of smoke, and the burning of paper in circle, if you want the paper in the cauldron to go up quickly, Harper says to try tossing in a little gunpowder before you light it. Unrestricted gunpowder doesn't explode; it just burns very quickly, and if you use smokeless powder (available at sporting goods stores) it will be easier to breathe during the rest of the ritual. Don't use too much though--just a couple of tablespoons will do the trick!

ON THE GARDEN PATH TO ENLIGHTENMENT



The time that spring makes it promises. Lady's Day, when the world begins to move toward Spring. Bah! It's a frozen wasteland out there and won't even think about being spring for several months.

This has been a difficult winter, but, ironically, I suspect that the garden is doing very well. There has been constant snow cover since the first freeze. Under all that frozen stuff the perennials are snug and happy. Spring, when it does arrive, will be glorious!

In the meantime there are seed catalogues to peruse. I seem to be on the last of every nursery in the country. My resolution is generally to get the seed order out the same time as the tax returns; I'm almost ready. I'm going to try and do a more planned garden this time, with an emphasis on old-fashioned favorites. Theoretically, this means that my garden will grow lushly without help and these particular plants will be jsut as hardy as

the weeds, which they'll out compete.

Staying ahead of the weeds may not be a great idea. I have a friend who is a professiona head gardener. Her job consists mostly, these past years, with directing the other gardeners on what to do. She is paid to do things like design and landscape and repair. Not to weed. She complained to me that she feels less grounded than she should and can't seem to find time to meditate and do internal repairs. I know what she means; that's kink of how I feel all winter.

I've managed not to kill any houseplants this year. Some I've never attempted to raise and can find no information about. The Patchouli plants have become rather alarming; ugly plants, really, with a beautiful scent. I suspect that they are actually bushes in their natural home. I wonder just how much spreading they plan to do or how big a pot they'll eventually need. It's somewhat frightening to contemplate. Mugwort keeps trying to convince me to give up on the Hyacinth that we obtained at Yule. He says it's dead; I say it's just slow. I don't give up on plants. Or the hope that spring will arrive.
